


# **Early Childhood Education** in Delaware



State and federal funding enables more than 9,983 children and families in Delaware to access high-quality, public and private, early childhood programs.<sup>1</sup>

## Early Childhood Education Economic Impact

In addition to the benefits to young children, access to affordable, high-quality child care can increase parental labor force participation and family economic stability. Child care problems, however, adversely affect both state and national economies. As a direct result of child care issues, the national economy loses upward of \$57 billion annually in the form of lost earnings, productivity, and revenue.<sup>14</sup>

Labor force participation of mothers with children under the age of 5 increased from 68.8% in 2019 to 69.5% in 2021.<sup>16</sup>

### Nationwide<sup>17</sup>

The percent of families that reported difficulty finding space in a home- or center-based program increased dramatically from 22% in December 2021 to 58% in January 2022.

71% of parents report that difficulty finding child care has impacted their ability to work.

- Population Under Six: 64.343<sup>29</sup>

- 67.62% of children under six have all available parents in the workforce<sup>31</sup>



- 25% of Delaware residents live in a "child care desert" 32

- The average price of child care is \$9,218 per year<sup>34</sup>
- The median household income is \$106,395<sup>35</sup>

Despite the critical nature of their work, early educators are among the most underpaid workers in the nation.<sup>37</sup>

### The Temporary Impact of ARPA Funding

In Delaware, 26,738 child care spots were saved by ARPA funds.<sup>39</sup>

Of providers who received stabilization grants:40

used funds to pay debts taken on in the course of the pandemic, including
