

Early Head Start - Child Care Partnerships

Early Head Start - Child Care Partnerships (EHS-CCP) is a competitive federal grant program that allows Early Head Start grantees to partner with local child care providers, both in-home and center-based, to improve the quality of care and expand the capacity and benefits of Early Head Start. Through these partnerships, the best of Early Head Start programs are reaching more children in a variety of settings while maximizing federal dollars.

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Since 2013, the partnership grants have offered an innovative and efficient model that maximizes funding by joining together the strengths of child care and Early Head Start to increase access to high-quality learning, while also expanding access to essential services such as health and developmental screenings, for our youngest children facing barriers.

● Maximizing Program Strengths

The partnerships' ability to bring together the strengths of Early Head Start and child care are especially beneficial.

Child care centers and family child care providers:

- Often offer more flexible and convenient full-day, full-year services for working families.
- Have experience providing care that is responsive to the cultural, linguistic, and social needs of families and their local communities.
