

# Child Care & Early Learning in Rhode Island

In Rhode Island, federal and state early learning opportunities serve more than **14,526** children,<sup>1</sup> or **22%** of children ages 5 and under.<sup>2</sup>

High-quality child care and early learning programs support children's healthy development while giving parents peace of mind as they work or attend school.

While several federally funded programs help working families access quality child care, limited funding leaves many eligible children unserved. These challenges not only affect families but also employers and the broader economy. Each year, child care shortages across the country impose significant economic costs on families, businesses, and state tax revenues.

Rhode Island's early learning landscape operates through a mixed-delivery system of diverse programs, each with distinct eligibility requirements, funding structures, and service delivery models designed to maximize parental choice.

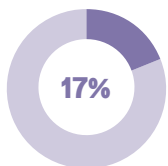
## RHODE ISLAND PROGRAM REACH

Existing federal child care and early learning programs, combined with state-funded pre-K, form a mixed delivery system that aims to meet children's individual needs. However, at current funding levels, only a fraction of eligible families are served.

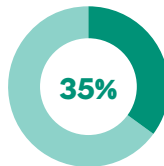

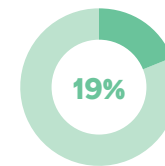

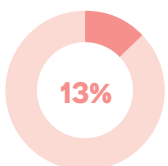

# RHODE ISLAND FEDERAL & STATE CHILD CARE AND EARLY LEARNING FUNDING

## CCDBG

CCDBG allows states to provide child care assistance to low-income working families with children under age 13, helping parents access child care in a setting of their choice.

- Income eligibility: **49% of state median income** (**\$51,636 per year** for a family of 3)<sup>38,39</sup>
- Monthly cost of center-based infant care
  - No subsidy: **\$1,581**<sup>40</sup>
  - Maximum copayment with subsidy: **\$301**<sup>41</sup>
  - Potential savings: **\$1,280**
- 658** child care providers accept CCDBG subsidies<sup>42</sup>
- Child care workers' median wage: **\$17.56 per hour** (**\$36,530 per year**)<sup>43</sup>

States must establish child care licensing requirements, including staff-to-child ratios, to ensure children are cared for in safe, quality environments. Different rules may apply depending on the setting (e.g., center- or home-based), and some providers may be exempt from licensing requirements (e.g., faith-based programs).

The state has set the following ratios for licensed center-based care:<sup>44</sup>

## EARLY HEAD START/HEAD START

Early Head Start and Head Start provide high-quality early learning and comprehensive services – including health, nutrition, and family support – at no cost to eligible families. Programs are federally funded and locally administered.<sup>45</sup> Children are eligible based on family income, if they receive TANF, SNAP, or SSI benefits, or if they are in foster care or experiencing homelessness. Head Start programs must reserve at least 10% of enrollment slots for children with disabilities.

- Income eligibility: at or below the federal poverty level (**\$27,320** for a family of 3)<sup>46</sup>
- In Rhode Island: **8 Head Start grants** fund **39 program sites**, serving **2,551 children**.<sup>47, 48, 49</sup>
- Rhode Island does not serve any children in Migrant and Seasonal Head Start or American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) Head Start.<sup>50</sup>

## PDG B-5

To date, Rhode Island has been awarded **\$49.9 million** in funds through Preschool Development Grant Birth through Five (PDG B-5).<sup>51</sup>

PDG B-5 is a competitive federal grant program designed to improve states' early childhood systems. Rhode Island's PDG B-5 accomplishments include:<sup>52</sup>

- Piloting a registered apprenticeship program for infant/toddler teachers, creating a pathway to increase availability of highly qualified teachers.
- Expanding pre-K by more than 500 seats.

## CDCTC

In 2022, **17,690** Rhode Island families claimed the CDCTC.<sup>53</sup>

The CDCTC directly helps working parents offset the cost of child care. In 2025, the CDCTC was permanently updated for the first time since 2001. Many filers could see their credit increase by as much as \$450 (for one child) or \$900 (for two or more children) in tax year 2026.<sup>54</sup>



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
